Kate Weisburd's primary interests are in the areas of criminal investigation and adjudication, civil rights, and emerging technology. Professor Weisburd's research focuses on the changing dimensions of criminal procedure and punishment and how these shifts impact inequity and privacy. Her recent scholarly work has appeared or is forthcoming in the California Law Review, Virginia Law Review, Northwestern Law Review, Washington University Law Review, Boston University Law Review, Iowa Law Review, North Carolina Law Review, and the UCLA Law Review, and she has written for the Marshall Project, the LA Times, as well as other mainstream media.

Professor Weisburd graduated from Columbia Law School, where she received the Bernstein Litowitz Berger & Grossmann Fellowship for Public Interest. Prior to attending law school, she worked as an investigator in death penalty cases at the Southern Center for Human Rights in Atlanta, Georgia. Professor Weisburd received her BA from Brown University, where she was a Truman Scholar. She clerked for the Honorable Lawrence K. Karlton in the US District Court for the Eastern District of California.

Nathan is a Senior Counsel in the Computer Crime and Intellection Property Section of the Department of Justice. He specializes in issues related to obtaining electronic evidence in criminal investigations, including the Fourth and Fifth Amendments, the Stored Communications Act, and the Wiretap Act. His recent litigation has addressed topics such as: obtaining geofence location information from Google; compelling the owner of an encrypted device to assist with decryption; and the use of cell-site simulators to locate cell phones. He also assisted with drafting and defending the 2016 amendment to Rule 41 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure for remote access search warrants in investigations involving Internet anonymizing technologies or botnets. Nathan received a B.S. in Electrical Engineering and an A.B. in History from Washington University in St. Louis, an M.S. in Electrical Engineering and Computer Science from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and a J.D., magna cum laude, from the Harvard Law School.

She also is a member of the American Law Institute and currently serves on several public health boards including the CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices' COVID-19 Vaccine Working Group, the American Society of Law, Medicine, and Ethics, and the Scientific Advisory Council of the Foundation for Opioid Response Efforts. Dean Matthew graduated with an AB in economics from Harvard-Radcliffe, obtained a JD from the University of Virginia, and received a PhD in health and behavioral sciences from the University of Colorado at Denver.

Melissa M. Goldstein, JD, is an Associate Professor in the Department of Health Policy and Management at the Milken Institute School of Public Health at the George Washington University, where she teaches courses in bioethics (including genomics, reproductive ethics, end-of-life, and research ethics issues), health information technology policy, and public health law and conducts research on health information privacy and the legal and policy aspects of health information technology. Professor Goldstein is a former director of the Markle Foundation's health program, where she managed the policy subcommittee of Connecting for Health and other policy aspects of the foundation's work in health information technology. Ms. Goldstein has also worked as a legal consultant to President Clinton's National Bioethics Advisory Commission, a senior litigation associate at Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher, and Flom, LLP, and a White House Fellow and domestic policy advisor to Vice President Al Gore.

Professor Goldstein graduated Phi Beta Kappa from the University of Virginia, received her law degree from Yale Law School, and completed a post-doctoral fellowship in bioethics and health policy at Johns Hopkins and Georgetown Universities. She has served as a member of GW's IRB and hospital ethics committee and speaks frequently on issues in bioethics, health policy, health information privacy, and health information technology. Ms. Goldstein's recent research and writings have focused on privacy and security issues in health information exchange and the use of big data, as well as the effects of health information technology on the physician-patient relationship and patient engagement. During the 2010-2011 academic year, Professor Goldstein served as a senior advisor to the Chief Privacy Officer in the Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Most recently, Professor Goldstein served as the Assistant Director for Bioethics and Privacy in the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy during the final year of the Obama Administration.
